Fighting misinformation

Former First Drafter and DFRLab fellow <u>Andy Carvin</u> moderated the conference's opening panel on global strategies in fighting misinformation. Rounding off the session, he asked the other participants for practical recommendations in the ongoing battle. All but one turned on the social media platforms.

<u>Hazel Baker</u>, global head of UGC newsgathering at Reuters, suggested what she called a "pause button" when people try to share something during news critical moments, like on election days or during natural disasters.
