Here's what happens when political bubbles collide | The Conversation

Social media has transformed how people talk to each other. But social media platforms are not shaping up to be the utopian spaces for human connection <u>their</u> <u>founders hoped</u>.

Instead, the internet has introduced phenomena that can influence national elections and maybe even <u>threaten democracy</u>.

<u>Echo chambers</u> or "bubbles" – in which people interact mainly with others who share their political views – arise from the way communities <u>organize themselves</u> online.

When the organization of a social network affects political discussion on a large scale, the consequences can be enormous.

In our <u>study</u> released on September 4, we show that what happens at the connection points, where bubbles collide, can significantly sway political decisions toward one party or another. We call this phenomenon "information gerrymandering."
