An <u>online memorial</u> for New Yorkers who died of Covid-19. Local residents <u>documenting public meetings</u>. <u>Office hours</u> and "pop-up newsrooms" in public libraries.

Projects like these, which focus on giving people <u>information</u> they need to make the places they live better, are the focus of a <u>new report</u>, out Thursday, that calls on local journalism's would-be saviors to focus their energy and funding on collaborative efforts, startups, and community groups — not on legacy news organizations.
